Thought for the week Second Sunday in Advent

The opening of St Mark's Gospel can leave us feeling short-changed as the evangelist plunges into a proclamation of the Good News story with a minimum of introduction - no angels, shepherds, crib or manger for Mark: just a brief reference to the Hebrew Scriptures, the bare bones about John the Baptist, and we are off into a seemingly breathless account of Jesus's adult ministry.

Yet, whenever I read or hear the opening words of this Gospel, I am reminded of an inspirational series of talks I heard by the late Russian Orthodox Metropolitan of Souzah, Anthony Bloom. He shared with us his own remarkable conversion story: as a young man in his mid-tolate teens, he was at a youth camp one Summer. He was dismayed to learn that a priest had been invited to talk to the young people there; as serious unbelievers, he and his friends were suitably indignant, and attended only out of a sense of duty and courtesy. The young Anthony found what he heard utterly unconvincing and even repellent, but being a young man of intellectual integrity he decided to read the Gospel story in order to "prove" to himself that what the priest had said was so much rubbish. He chose to read Mark's Gospel simply because it was the shortest. In his own words:

"Before I reached the third chapter of the Gospel, I suddenly became aware that on the other side of my desk there was a Presence. And the certainty was so strong that it was Christ standing there, that it has never left me" (School for prayer, p. xii).

Few of us will have had such profound and unexpected mystical experiences, and yet if we listen to Mark's opening words attentively, we may be drawn more deeply into the mystery he is about to narrate. Skilled story-teller that he is, Mark whets our appetite for meeting this 'someone' who will follow John and baptise with the Holy Spirit. With an astonishing economy of style, the very next verse after the end of today's reading brings Jesus centre stage for his own baptism by John, followed by his temptation in the wilderness and, the beginning of his earthly ministry.

Quite why Mark chose to narrate in this way is not known, but it seems to me that his style invites us to participate in the scenes in our imaginations. If we allow ourselves to be present to what is happening, God may communicate with us directly. Perhaps we, like Anthony Bloom, will become aware of the Presence of Christ Jesus standing there, inviting us to more.
