Thought for the Week 12th January 2020 The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

So, Christmas is over for another year. The decorations have been put away, our lives return to a 'normal' routine and around me I notice people becoming less joyful and more careworn. 'It's the post-Christmas blues' I was told – 'just returning to normal life'. I understand this, but todays readings remind us that 'normal life' should be joyful. We are God's 'children by adoption' the Collect tells us, a people chosen by God to 'serve the cause of right' (Isiah 42:6), We are called as His children, to 'give the Lord glory' (Ps 28:1) and we are asked to do this as one family, for God accepts and loves 'anybody of any nationality' (Acts 10:35). Is this not cause to rejoice? Even in the quieter days of January, even in the darker days that follow a loss, even in the trials and tribulations of living in this modern world, with all it's pressures and conflicts?

Across the world, at macro and micro level, there are many problems, politically, socially and economically.
