Thought for the Week 12thApril 2020 Easter Sunday

Today we celebrate Easter, marking the end of our Lenten journey. Unlike any other Easter in living memory, we as a community are unable to gather together in the usual way.

But all of us are bearing witness to the message of Easter in the wonderful acts of bravery, self-sacrifice, and love shown by our united response to the coronavirus crisis.

Speaking of the isolation imposed by social distancing measures, Pope Francis said:

In our First Reading today we hear that the amazing good deeds done by Jesus in Judaea were because 'God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power'. We too have those gifts from God, which will sustain us now and forever.

In the words of Pope Francis:

In the silence of our cities, the Easter Gospel will resound. In the risen Jesus, life conquered death. Hope is nourished by our Paschal Faith
