Thought for the week 24th Sunday of the Year 12th September, 2021

I wonder why Jesus wanted to know who the people thought he was. This is the question he asks his disciples in the gospel reading this week. Did this matter to him who they thought he was? Was this a way of him checking on how he and his teachings had been received up until that point?

And then why, after the disciples identified him correctly, did he then tell them not to tell anyone?

I do not know the answers to any of these questions.

Could it be that Jesus was confirming what he already knew, that those failing to acknowledge and accept who he was would eventually have him put to death?

Then there is the rather harsh rebuke to Peter followed by a statement that suggests several requirements for who want to follow Jesus: that they renounce themselves, and that they take up their cross.

This has to be the hardest thing in this modern age where everything is about finding out who one is and about being the best one can be- whatever you do. We are to a great extent defined by what we do - are we to renounce this? I would like to think not. I would like to think that we should be the best that we can be, not for ourselves, but for the role we have in building God's kingdom while here on earth. I would like to think that once we discern this, renouncing what we would like for our own satisfaction, could be easier.

The next requirement is to take up our cross. To accept that the road will not be easy while we follow Him- we will face rejection and pain but, as the psalmist puts it, our feet will be kept from stumbling, our eyes from tears and our souls from death, for as long as we walk in the presence of the Lord.
