I enjoy listening to Desert Island Discs on Radio 4 and a couple of years ago the guest was Edna Adan Ismail, who was born in 1937 and grew up in what was then called British Somaliland.

She became a midwife and her dream was to build a state of the art maternity hospital in her homeland.

"I was born with a desire to fix things," she says.

Edna sold all her possessions to help fund the realisation of her dream and it took Edna over 50 years to achieve it. The hospital opened in 2002 and has since seen the birth of over 22,000 babies. Edna at the age of 83 is still working, still sharing her talents.

Her mantra, "If I don't do it, who will?" reminded me of a meditation of Newman's.

"God has created me to do Him some definite service; He has committed some work to me which he has not committed to another."

So when we listen to today's Gospel, the parable of the talents, perhaps we can ask ourselves,

"What service has been entrusted to me? What task will be left undone, unless I do it?"

We don't have to panic and start thinking about establishing hospitals, but, we can look closer to home. In these challenging times of lockdown what talents can we share, who can we help, what role can we take on? Look out for your neighbour, call your elderly relative for a chat, help someone with their gardening, cook a meal for someone, give something from your cupboard to your local foodbank. Share your talents.

In the parable of the talents Jesus exhorts us not to waste what the Father has entrusted to each one of us. So, let us reflect on what talent each of us has been given and what may be left undone in our community unless each one of us plays our part.

It is important that we do not bury our talents.
