Thought for the Week 15th January, 2023 2nd Sunday in ordinary time.

'he stooped down to me; he heard my cry.'

The responsorial psalm this weekend is a song of praise written by King David. Psalm 39(40) starts as a hymn of praise to the Lord (verses 1-11), before becoming a prayer for help (verses12-17, which are not included in this week's Mass).

When I first read this psalm, what really caught my attention was how David waited and waited, patiently persevering in prayer and how the Lord stoops down to hear him.

For me, this sense of God bending down, removing any distance between Himself and His servant, is comforting and encouraging - like a parent crouching down to a child, asking, "What do you want to ask?" and the child knowing that their wish will be granted.

In the psalm the Lord hears David's cry and offers him a new song to sing - a song of praise. David praises the Lord because he knows that his prayer will be answered, as it had been in the past. David's response is to listen, he offers himself with 'an open ear'.

Perhaps this is a format we can use when we pray. Praise the Lord and thank Him for gifts and blessings already received and then, as we ask for help again, listen with an open ear as we try to discern His plan for us. God does not require sacrifices from us; He longs for us to listen to Him and willingly obey Him. Only then are we following in the steps of Christ, the most obedient servant of all.
