25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

One of the consequences of the lock-down was a shrinking of our world – how far we could travel, who we could see, how often we could go to work. For some this shrinking of the horizon and slowing in the pace of our lives was very welcome. We may secretly dread life picking up speed again as the new school year starts and things get back to something nearing normal. Others have suffered pain and loneliness during lock down. Getting out more is a welcome liberation.

We experience and respond to events in different ways. For some the glass always looks half full; for others it's half empty, or worse. One day I wake up feeling very positive and happy; the next sad and fretful. However hard we try, we are inconsistent and prone to fluctuations of mood.

Today's readings contrast our contrariness with the steadfast reliability of our compassionate, merciful, loving Father. Though our understanding of who God is, who we are, and how we should respond to Him may shift from day to day, He is unchanging. His mercy is without limit. His forgiveness is never withheld. His compassion is endless.

Thank goodness - our failings do not diminish Him in any way. He is always there for us and we can count on Him. It doesn't matter how early or late in life we come to know Him. The reward is the same. As St Augustine says in his Confessions: '*late have I loved thee, Beauty so ancient and so new, late have I loved thee...you were with me but I was not with you*'.

Held back by our own weaknesses we consistently underestimate the sheer graciousness of God. We cleave to a glass half full when He promises us a glass overflowing with grace.
