


PARISH NEWSLETTER - 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 27 July 2025

I think we all know that when we take something out of context we're likely to get the wrong meaning. It's a tried and true practice of the media, who can make anybody say just about anything by ensuring the wider context of what happened or what was said isn't reported. It's a principle we have to apply to our First Reading this weekend which has so often been used to demonise others because of their sexuality.

Abraham is haggling with God over the fate of Sodom and Gomorrah: 'if just ten good people are found there will you spare it?'And apparently there weren't because they're the stuff of legend as they go up in a puff of smoke! But what did they do that was so bad in the eyes of the writers of the book of Genesis?

Today's passage comes just ten verses after last Sunday's passage: the visit of the Lord to Abraham in the form of three strangers under the oak at Mamre. And that incident, above all things, was a story of



hospitality. Hospitality was everything to a nomadic, desert people: it wasn't just politeness, but a matter of life or death. In an environment where food and water was scarce or absent, not to welcome a stranger was to sentence them to death. What Abraham did wasn't to offer a nice afternoon tea: he honoured those strangers as his brothers by treating them as he would hope to be treated by them in return.

In the famous icon by Rublev (pictured) the tables are turned on that event. and the three strangers are seen as an image of the Trinity: the divine communion of Persons which leaves a place at the table for *us*. The scene of Abraham's hospitality becomes an image of God's divine hospitality of heart, which we experience in every Eucharist.

But the common denominator is hospitality. And it was the common denominator missing from Sodom. As we read on, the three strangers, and Lot's family too, were treated with contempt and unwelcome, were misused and abused, were not treated with the hospitality and respect which was the code of honour of a desert and nomadic people.

The great Rublev icon is dominated by that space in the foreground, the place reserved for the stranger at the table of the God who is Trinity, the God who is hospitality. It's the contrast between that scene and the scene which later follows in Sodom which gives us its meaning. The Sodomite is the one whose heart has no hospitality for the stranger, for the one who is different, for the one who is outside the circle of acceptance; the sodomite is the one who sees the refugee as a problem rather than as a brother or sister indwelt by the living God, the one who looks on a prisoner as a problem to be locked away, rather than a child of God as full of the Holy Spirit as any of us are.

The virtue of Abraham was his welcome to the three strangers – and remember, they were strangers: he didn't know who they were, they weren't his family, or his friends, not even his countrymen. But he sat them at his table as God does to us. And to everyone. This passage is a challenge to imitate the divine hospitality of the heart of God which sets up no boundaries of exclusion.
